Solutions to Quiz #2

Do *both* of the following questions. Show all your work!

1. Compute  $\lim_{x \rightarrow 4} \frac{x^2 - x - 12}{x^2 + x - 20}$ . [2.5]

SOLUTION. Both the numerator and the denominator approach 0 as  $x$  approaches 4, so we seek to simplify them to evaluate the limit. The key is to factor them both:

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow 4} \frac{x^2 - x - 12}{x^2 + x - 20} = \lim_{x \rightarrow 4} \frac{(x - 4)(x + 3)}{(x - 4)(x + 5)} = \lim_{x \rightarrow 4} \frac{x + 3}{x + 5} = \frac{4 + 3}{4 + 5} = \frac{7}{9} \quad \square$$

2. Compute  $\lim_{x \rightarrow \pi/4} \frac{1 - \sin(2x)}{\sin(x) - \cos(x)}$ . [2.5]

SOLUTION. Again, both the numerator and the denominator approach 0 as  $x$  approaches  $\pi/4$ , so we seek to simplify them to evaluate the limit. The key is to expand the numerator using the trigonometric identities  $\sin(2x) = 2 \sin(x) \cos(x)$  and  $\sin^2(x) + \cos^2(x) = 1$ , and then factor it:

$$\begin{aligned} \lim_{x \rightarrow \pi/4} \frac{1 - \sin(2x)}{\sin(x) - \cos(x)} &= \lim_{x \rightarrow \pi/4} \frac{\sin^2(x) + \cos^2(x) - 2 \sin(x) \cos(x)}{\sin(x) - \cos(x)} \\ &= \lim_{x \rightarrow \pi/4} \frac{\sin^2(x) - 2 \sin(x) \cos(x) + \cos^2(x)}{\sin(x) - \cos(x)} \\ &= \lim_{x \rightarrow \pi/4} \frac{(\sin(x) - \cos(x))^2}{\sin(x) - \cos(x)} \\ &= \lim_{x \rightarrow \pi/4} (\sin(x) - \cos(x)) \\ &= \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{4}\right) - \cos\left(\frac{\pi}{4}\right) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} - \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} = 0 \quad \blacksquare \end{aligned}$$
